GARDENING TIPS

It's the time of year when you're thinking about how to spruce up your garden...

As well as thinking of a little DIY project?

Why not combine the two, and make your garden a DIY project?

And if you're stuck for ideas on what to create, here are a few suggestions for you.

1. Create a kids play area

Most kids love building sandcastles at the beach. Why not bring the seaside to your own back garden.

It'll be extremely rewarding too.

2. Get spring cleaning?

Every garden can receive help from a good tidy up. And it might not take much to turn your garden into a fabulous garden.

As well as clearing up any leaves and rubbish, dig out weeds and plants that haven't survived the frost.

Bring out the jet wash to clean any grime off paving slabs and walls. Give everywhere a good sweep.

Cracked or missing pieces in your paving slabs make a dramatic difference to your outdoor space; it's worth taking the opportunity to redesign your look while you're replacing them.

To help you make your hanging baskets and planters last all summer, we have some handy tips for you. These tips also work well for perennials, in planters and baskets, or in the beds.

Deadheading Your Tubs

Deadheading flowers is a task that most keen gardeners seem to enjoy. Summer evenings are the perfect time to wander around the garden with a pair of snips, admiring your handiwork and snipping off dead blooms.

It's important to deadhead flowering perennials and bedding plants. This encourages them to produce more flowers. This is because the plant channels all of its energy back into the flowers instead of growing seed heads. By leaving the flowers to die on the stems, the plant assumes their job is done—and doesn't bother flowering again.

With smaller bedding plants, you can pinch the flower head at the top of the stem and remove it. Thicker stems will need cutting. Remove the dead flowers below the dead bloom or just above the next healthy leaves. Keep an eye out for any small buds that have not yet opened. The last thing you want to be doing is to cut off immature buds as well as dead flowers.

If you have a large garden, deadheading can become a time-consuming job, so make a point of doing it daily—at a time that's convenient for you. So your garden looks lovely and you don't end up with lots of dead flowers spoiling your view.

Watering Your Hanging Baskets

It is very important to water your hanging baskets, planters and tubs at least once a day, but ideally twice a day. Especially when the weather is hot. Earlier in the morning and early evening are great times to water your plants. This gives the water a chance to penetrate the soil without evaporating in the hot sun and helps to prevent the leaves and flowers burning.

This should help to keep your Planters, Tubs and Hanging Baskets in excellent shape throughout the whole summer.

Understanding Your Lawn and How to Care for It

Lawns are resilient, but they still need the correct care to flourish. Many people try to achieve short, fine, bowling green lawns, but at what cost?

Knowing Your Lawn Type

Hardwearing turf is what you will need for your lawn areas where there will be high traffic.' High traffic means excessive footfall from playing children and dogs so, it needs to withstand a certain about of wear and tear shall we say. This type of lawn is formulated with a higher percentage of ryegrass, and ryegrass is a much thicker grass type that allows it to bounce back from stress. So, don't expect to have a bowling green from a few short cuts on your hardwearing garden lawn, it won't happen. You need a finer lawn for that.

Ornamental turf is a special blend of fine grass seed. This specific mix is not found in the grass seeds, mixes or turf that you would usually use in your gardens. A lower percentage of thicker grass types are used, and a higher percentage of finer grasses are introduced to allow for that pristine canvas when it's been cut. The finer grass types, however, make this turf less hardwearing and the care for this type of lawn is often invasive, regimented and persistent. You'll need to mow it at least twice a week in the growing season with a cylindrical mower to achieve a short, neat cut. You can see why it's called 'ornamental' it's meant to be admired, not used

Mowing Requirements

Avoid excessively close mowing on all lawn types as although attractive, it can weaken the grass, encouraging shallow rooting and making the lawn more susceptible to drought, weeds, and moss, because of this close-mown lawns need more frequent feeding and watering. When your lawn is fully mature (about 12months after its been laid,) cut ornamental lawns at around 13-25mm (½-1in) in Summer and up to 40mm (1.5in) in Spring and Autumn and for your hardwearing lawns, mow between 15 mm and 35 mm, once a week during the growing season. Take care to avoid scalping.

If your grass is fairly long, don't be tempted to go short on your first cut of the season as not only will you stress the grass, you will stress your mower motor too. Adjust the mower heights lower with each cut until it's at the desired height. Being patient will ensure your lawn is healthier in the long run
