copies of the Agenda, Report of the Directors and a personal copy of the Profit and Loss account and Balance sheet for the year ended 31st December 2014.

Please study these documents carefully, in advance, to prepare any questions you might have about the management of YOUR Club and come prepared to contribute to the discussions on our future direction.

We look forward to seeing ALL members in attendance at this important meeting from which the elected Directors explain past Policy and take advice on ways in which the operation of the Club might be improved.

Also, this year, there are vacancies on the Board to be filled. Colin Grimes, has indicated that, while he would be happy to continue to serve on the Board, he wishes to hand over the Chairman's responsibilities to someone else to guide the Club through the next stage of its development. Following the resignation of Roger Bentley, on health grounds, we are in urgent need of a replacement Green Ranger.

The unexpected and untimely death of Anita Lowder has created another Vacancy.

The Club Constitution states that the Board shall be composed of four representatives from each Section plus a Chairman who may be drawn from either Section. We therefore need at least two ladies and two men to volunteer their services.

To date, following the distribution of the Preliminary Notice of the AGM, inviting nominations for election to the Board, no responses have yet been received. * See below It is vitally important that these vacancies should be filled. YOU are urged to come forward to serve your Club.

The vitally important post of Green Ranger remains vacant.

"PAY & PLAY" MEMBERSHIP TO BE INTRODUCED

2015 recruitment drive gets underway.

As part of preparations for the opening of the 2015 Season on 4th April, the Board is launching a new grade of membership in a bid to attract more players to the Club.

The unemployed and those on benefits can already qualify for a one year free membership. Anyone still in full-time education qualifies for a flat rate £10 per annum subscription.

Now, for anyone else who would like to try the game, but who is unable or unready to commit to full participation in the programme of fixtures and competitions, the Club is offering "Pay and Play" membership for a basic annual fee of £10 plus £3.50 per game played. This compares with the 2015 annual membership subscription for a full Club Member which has been set at £97.50.

In a joint statement, Club Presidents, Ken Renshaw and Sheila Aindow, say:

"We are keen to attract new members, especially younger players, to our Club. However, we recognise that those who are still working have only limited time to spare to devote to sports and other recreational activities. They are simply not able to make themselves available for selection for matches against other Clubs or for involvement in Club competitions. It might simply be a lack of confidence that holds them back from immediate, full commitment.

It is not surprising if such potential members feel that they would not get value for money if they joined as full Members. Nevertheless, we would like to see as many people as possible benefit from the fitness, friendship and fun that is provided through the great game of bowls, a sport in which the young and old of both sexes can play on equal terms, accessed through a vibrant Club like ours.

In answer to these special conditions, and in order to minimise the barriers to participation, we are now offering such individuals this special membership deal.

The £10 + £3.50 "Pay & Play" deal offers unlimited opportunity to play as often or as little as it suits individual circumstances. Full Members will always be available to give advice and coaching at no extra cost. (Only Full Members will have keys to enable access to the Clubhouse).

Sets of bowls (woods) can be made available on free loan. The only equipment needed is a pair of grey trousers, a white shirt/blouse and flat soled shoes.

Under normal circumstances, the incentive is expected to be available for an initial one year only. However, subject to approval by the Board, this period might be extended according to personal circumstances."

COMPUTER BASICS SESSIONS

A surprisingly strong response has been received to the proposal to offer help with computer use, starting on Tuesday 16th February for the following six weeks. Absolute beginners are offered up to 4 weekly sessions of an hour each. Those with some knowledge but who require help with specific processes and programmes will be offered not less than 2 hours support in each area.

The schedule of sessions has been posted on the main noticeboard. A fee of £2 per session will be charged with all proceeds going into Club funds.

Anyone who finds that the session offered is inconvenient should notify Colin Grimes as soon as possible.

Participants are invited to bring their own laptops or tablets so that as much "hands on" experience as possible can be gained from each session.

Colin Grimes says: "While I do have some experience in most aspects of computer use, I hope that everyone understands that I am by no means an IT "expert". I will not be able to answer everyone's needs. Hopefully, I will be able to share my experience and give Members the confidence to try new things – or simply get them started without fear. If there are questions that I can't handle, I can probably point people in the right direction and identify sources of appropriate support. I plan to make the sessions fun and very much "hands-on" from the start."

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CLUB FINANCES



Finance Director, Rolf Meyer, reviews the audited accounts. The Board of Directors has good cause to be very pleased about the financial outcome of

the year ended 31st December 2014.

When you receive your copy of the audited Profit & Loss Account and the Balance Sheet, you will see that in spite of the challenges presented by the extension project and the replacement of the sprinkler system for the green, we have managed to increase unallocated reserves by close to £1000, after making allowances for the £10,000 loan from the Men's Section.

Bar turnover and profits reached record levels; our close Season social programme netted close to £3000 over the year; coffee morning revenues increased by nearly 15% and fundraising (net of the Sport England grant) raised £10,500 on top of the £5000 raised in the previous year.

Sincere thanks are due to everyone who played a part – no matter how small, in contributing to this growth and success.

On the expenditure side, apart from registered increases in rates and utilities and additional expenditure on marketing and promotion (largely associated with the extension project) we demonstrated very tight control.

Of course, because of the significantly increased capital value of the Club, following the completion of the extension and the sprinkler

installation, depreciation naturally shows a marked increase. The net position has enabled us to add £43,740 to the Balance Sheet giving us an increase in net worth from £23,748 to £70,000.

With the benefit of the retained loan from the Men's Section, and continued benefit from the Section levies (£1500 Men; £500 Ladies) the Club is once again in a sound financial position With reserves to cover (almost) a full year's trading.

On behalf of the Board, I have no hesitation in commending the audited accounts or adoption at the AGM.

Of course, both auditor, Adam Longley, and I will be very happy to answer any questions you might have about the details at the AGM on 9th March.
