For the past three years I have held the position of Catering Manager for the Men's section, but at the end of the current season I will be standing down. I would like to thank everyone who has co-operated by taking turns in the kitchen, thus ensuring that we provide the best teas possible. I would particularly like to thank all of those ladies who have volunteered their services. Without their help we would not have been able to provide a full tea at every match.

I feel disappointed that the Catering Manager's position has been weakened somewhat by not allowing him full control of what type of meal will be served and when it will be served. The decision of when to serve the teas has been taken away from the Men's Section and given to

the Club's AGM. I would personally express the hope that this decision will be put back to the Men's Section so that they can decide policy for themselves.

I wish my successor good luck and I will give any advice and help he may need. This is an excellent opportunity for those who were not satisfied with the way I did the job to step forward and volunteer. It is worth pointing out that, by offering a proper tea and charging £3.50, we make a profit of around £2000 per Season, thus keeping our membership fees to a reasonable figure.

Car Parking - Latest developments



The thorny issue of visitor car parking within the boundaries of Central Park, adjacent to the bowling green, continues to rumble on. Members may have read in the August edition of *Syston Town News* that the Council has now decided to withdraw their offer to share with the Club the costs of independent legal advice on the issue, and simply to exercise their (unchallengeable) power to refuse the Club's application to provide visitor parking within the Park close to the clubhouse.

What the report did not make clear is that, following informal legal consultations, the Council has now been obliged to concede that registration of the land as a Village Green does not prevent them from

using their discretion in this matter. There is no legal bar to parking.

A new set of Council representatives has been appointed to the Council/Club Liaison Group and an early meeting of the Group, to discuss a range of matters of mutual interest, can now be expected.

We hope to put forward clear arguments which will persuade the Council that their decision to sustain a visitor parking ban is unreasonable and detrimental both to the Club and the Town itself.

In the meantime, the Club has been given the keys to the gates of Memorial (Donkey) Park with full permission to use the car parking facilities provided there for both weekday and weekend use. While this facility is far from ideal, we can at least guarantee our visitors (Men & Ladies) will have somewhere to park without fear of attracting the attention of Parking Wardens.

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BACK TO BASICS

1.Be conversant with the Rules of Bowls 2.Make sure you are gripping your wood correctly

3.Check that when you adopt your stance

- on the mat, you are facing the "shoulder" of the arc of the hand you wish to play. Remember to be perfectly balanced and relaxed with knees slightly bent.
- 4. Make sure that your whole body flows through with your delivery, from the hand that delivers the wood to the back foot that lifts gently off the mat. Avoid stiffness in any part of the movement.
- 5. Be very conscious of the pace and general condition of the green because your arm and leg movements will be affected by them. (*The faster the green, the more "alive" the wood will become and the more sensitive the touch required. On heavier greens, the grip will need to be more firm than it requires on faster surfaces when it should be caressed by the fingers leading to a more delicate delivery. The movement is slower, the backswing shorter accompanied by a graceful follow-through in a single gliding movement.)*
- 6. Having estimated weight by looking at the jack, keep your eyes firmly fixed on the "shoulder" of the intended arc of your delivery. Keep your head down until after you have released the wood.
- 7. Practise, practise, practise and try to become proficient in all shots of the game. Remember that there is a perfect weight and green combination for every shot attempted and nothing gives more satisfaction than a successful shot combining both elements.
- 8. Always be positive when you step on to the mat. Have confidence in the shot you have decided to play.
- 9. Always stand well back from the mat while your opponent has possession. Never be over-eager to play your shot, Take your time to fully assess the position before you bowl.
- 10. Use the mat and the jack intelligently. Always have a sound reason for every tactical move you make.
- 11. Remember that bowling is a team game. (*There is no "I" in "TEAM"*.) Four players playing their own game, no matter how individually talented they might be, will never be a successful side.
- 12. While the Skip is in overall charge and has the final say, his/her main responsibility is to have the team playing for each other. When the Skip leaves the head, No3 takes over control of the head. If the head is changed before a Skip is to deliver his/her wood, any advice from No3 about what shot to play must be taken seriously.

"Wrapped up"

Flexible income options have risen in popularity since the introduction of new pension freedoms.

New figures published by the Association of British Insurers (ABI) have provided an early insight into what people are choosing to do with their retirement savings following April's radical changes to pensions.

Although it's early days, predictions that the reforms would lead to more people choosing income drawdown – a pension wrapper where savings are left invested – appear to be wellfounded. In 2012, when annuity purchases were at their peak, income drawdown accounted for less than 10% of retirement income solutions. The popularity of income drawdown has now risen to a point where the amount of new money invested exceeds that put towards buying annuities.

The ABI figures show that, in the first two months of the new pension freedoms, savers used £630 million to buy annuities, while £720 million was invested into income drawdown plans.

We're only a few months in, but clearly income drawdown is finding favour with people who want to keep their pension fund invested in a flexible wrapper, but annuities still have a role to play, and the figures back this up.

The reforms also allow retirement savers to bypass annuities and income drawdown altogether and dip into their savings by taking cash directly from their fund – an option known as an 'uncrystallised funds pension lump sum'. This is the alternative income solution Chancellor George Osborne alluded to in his Budget speech in March last year, when he said that savers would be able to use their pension pot "like a bank account".

Pension savers choosing this method withdrew over £1 billion in April and May, with the size of the average pot being £15,500. Over the same period, payments totaling £800 million were taken via income drawdown through 170,000 withdrawals.

Sensible seniors

The ABI says the figures show that those with smaller pension pots are those typically cashing out, whilst those with more substantial pots are using the accumulated funds to buy an income which, is the responsible approach. Given the tax implications of withdrawing large amounts, it's encouraging to see that it is mostly smaller pots being taken as lump sums. In reality, smaller pots will not provide much of a significant income boost over the course of retirement, so it makes sense for many people to use their funds in other ways.

However, some people are still making bad decisions. I agree that people should be trusted with their own money, but there are hidden dangers when drawing down a pension – especially in terms of Income Tax liability and the annual allowance. These are irreversible decisions and vitally important to get right, so people should always seek advice first.
