Gardening in November

Dark evenings and dull weather will not encourage you to go out and garden, but it is worth the effort, because even ten minutes a day can help to keep the garden looking smart. Jobs done now can ease the pressure during the busy spring next year.

Borders tidied up in the autumn will benefit from another going over with the hoe. Some of the weeds that can become a nuisance, such as chickweed, groundsel and bitter cress, these can germinate and make a lot of growth during the

sometimes-warm days of late autumn, they may even start in to flower and seed around the garden, depending on weather conditions. Chop off any lingering weed with the hoe and loosening the soil will also improve the look of what is sometimes an expanse of bare soil at this time. But remember that some of your bulb shoots are only just below the surface of the soil, so don't go too deep with the hoe.

Tidy up, and if possible, burn any fallen leaves from around your roses, then loosen the soil to keep down the weeds. This is more than just a cosmetic job as many rose diseases such as black spot, can over winter on fallen leaves and debris. Check the ties of standard roses, as these plants are vulnerable in winter winds. Make sure climbing roses are also tied in and that the ties are not too tight, if necessary, remove the old tie and use a new one. Protect your tender potted shrubs, don't let them succumb to the ravages of winter. Plants in pots and containers are much more vulnerable than those in the ground. If you can't put them in a porch, greenhouse or conservatory for the winter, there are things you can do to protect them. For instance, you can, if you have space, dig a hole and temporarily bury the pot to its rim, this will give protection to the roots, and then rap the plant in fleece

two or three rounds and tie with garden twine, this should help. If the container is too large to do that, then rap the whole thing in fleece and support the upper part to protect the plant with canes.

The cheery and cheeky robin is a year-round visitor to all gardens, but can be more frequent during the winter, they seem to appear from nowhere once you start to till the soil, they will often keep you company, pecking at grubs etc as you are working. They will sometimes eat fruit and berries, but they prefer grubs and insects, so they should be encouraged. They will also accept crumbs and scraps, so you should be able to keep them as regular visitors.

Woodpigeons are also regular winter visitors to the garden, and they can cause devastation among vegetables such as cabbage and Brussels once the weather becomes harsh. They will also damage many other garden plants if they become very hungry. If they have been a problem in other years, net vulnerable plants now. You could try bird scareres in your garden, such as stringing up old or unwanted CD discs these will spin in a light breeze, which gives movement and when the sun shines, sends shafts of light whizzing around the garden, and they don't like that.

Other things in brief

Continue to clear fallen leaves, especially in borders.

Bare rooted roses and hedging plants can be planted now.

Shrubs which are in the wrong place can be moved while the ground is still relatively warm.

Make sure newly planted trees and shrubs are well watered during a dry spell.

Plant hyacinths and tulips now.

Lift and store dahlias once the foliage has turned black due to frost.

When a really hard frost is forecast, protect newly planted evergreens with either sacking or old net curtains, etc. Wrap sacking or similar insulation around outdoor containers to protect roots of the plant from freezing.
