Top Tips for Cleaning and Maintenance Paving

Indian sandstone and limestone paving are one of the most popular landscaping products. We've pulled together our top tips for keeping them clean and maintained.

Maintaining and keeping natural paving clean

- . **1.** Sweep or brush regularly to remove dirt, leaves, and other debris. Move large items like tables, chairs, and BBQs before cleaning.
- 2. Remove weeds with a hoe or weeding knife to pull up from the roots.
- **3.** Replace mortar joints to prevent weed growth. Also investigate other fillers like resin for reduction of maintenance further.
- **4.** Use acid-free soapy water or diluted bleach water to clean. Pour soapy water or bleach solution on paving and let sit up to 15 minutes.

You may want to test a small area first. Scrub with heavy duty broom or stiff brush. Rinse with water and repeat if necessary. Make sure to think of surrounding plants and lawn and take care not to damage these.

5. For more stubborn stains you may want to use a jet or pressure washer.

Creating Depth in a Flat Garden Space

Many people think that a super flat garden is the nirvana of starting points. But if you're craving a garden full of interesting aspects and features, the evenness of the garden can actually be undesirable.

Level changes in the garden creates depth, a journey and interest – all the key elements every designer strives for in each garden. Walls are a great way to create depth in a garden.

Here are several types of walls that may be used.

- 1. Upright sleepers Retain a bank or steep level change with sleepers set in on its end. Perfect for creating curved walls, they're installed into concrete footings and additionally supported at the back (where the soil rests) with cross supports and finished with a damp proof liner or bitumen paint for a long-lasting result. A great choice if you're wanting something more natural
- 2. Brick walls Great for either traditional or contemporary gardens, depending on the choice of brick. Brick walls can support a large amount of earth and they're incredibly long lasting if build correctly.
- 3. 3. Linear sleepers Linear sleepers are used when straight walls are desired. Set in foundations like all well-built walls, these have upright support timbers to prevent bowing from the weight of the soil behind.
- **4. Gabions** These steel baskets or cages are strategically filled with stones to create a supporting wall. Coped with stone, gabions can look incredibly modern, and are popular with garden designers at high end shows such as Chelsea Flower Show. Ample space is needed as their construction is generally approx. 500m3

Your choice of retaining walls depends on the look you want to achieve and the investment you'd like to make. Sleeper walls are a popular option as they are cost effective. However, their lifespan is shorter brick versions.

Installing a pergola in your garden adds appeal to your space and home. They can serve as a focal point, define an outdoor space, provide shade as well as some protection from the elements, adding comfort and beauty to outdoor living

When deciding on structure material several factors should be weighed.

- Appearance Wood gives a more rustic, natural look and feel to your garden.
 Wood comes in different varieties and shades and can be painted to match or
 complement other structures on the property. They can be stained, or colour
 treated. Metal can also come in different finishes and shades. Metals provide a
 more modern, sleek look to an outdoor space. They can also be powder-coated any
 colour.
- 2. **Cos**t Wood pergolas are generally less expensive than metal. However, metal holds its shape and can be more durable than wood which may warp, crack, bow, or twist over time.
- 3. **Maintenance** Metal pergolas are basically maintenance free. Aluminium is lightweight and never rusts. Any type of metal won't splinter, sag, or twist as wood can. Wood weathers with age requiring sanding, staining, and/or re-painting. In addition, some types of wood may be susceptible to wood-damaging insects, moulds, and algae.

Before deciding on the type of pergola that is best for you think about these three factors.

VOLUNTEER CENTRE SUSTAINS SERVICES THROUGHOUT THE PANDEMIC

Syston and District Volunteer Centre has continued to provide support services to the local community throughout the pandemic. Volunteers have responded to requests for help with shopping and prescription collection and, with the help of a growing band of volunteer drivers, has provided personal transport to enable those in need to keep hospital and doctors' appointments.

Thanks to a grant from the National Lottery, the Centre has acquired a new wheelchair-adapted car. Quite naturally, under Covid-19 conditions, our team of volunteer drivers have been reluctant to use their own vehicles, as they would under normal circumstances. The two specially adapted cars now owned by the Centre have therefore enabled the transport needs of the local community to be met in a safe and secure manner.

In collaboration with the Syston Health Centre, volunteer drivers are currently fully engaged in transporting people to vaccination and testing centres.

Centre Manager, Andy Shelton and Transport Co-ordinator, Michael Court, have continued to work throughout, with other staff placed on furlough under Government regulations.

Sadly, the usual very popular weekly programme of trips and excursions, using the Centre's small fleet of minibuses, has had to be suspended and will remain so for the foreseeable future. This situation is causing the Board of Trustees to consider selling one of the minibuses, possibly using the income to buy another car – possibly electric – to provide greater capacity to meet individual transport needs. A recently confirmed grant from the Horace Taylor Fund is also now available to finance an extension to our fleet of vehicles.

As previously reported, thanks to a grant from the Woolfson Foundation, the Centre offices on School Street have been completely re-modelled to make them much more visitor-friendly and to enable staff to work within current COVID-19 restrictions.

Reviewing the operation of the Centre over the period since March 2020, Chairman of Trustees, Paul Lomas, says: "The Trustees and I take great pride in the fact that, with fantastic support and commitment from our small teams of staff and volunteers, the Centre has sustained an excellent record of providing vital service to everyone in need within our local communities of Syston and surrounding villages throughout the whole period of the pandemic to date.

We have made progress in the recruitment of additional volunteer drivers; we have expanded and upgraded our small fleet of vehicles; we have been successful in raising money through grants to fund our development plans while protecting our limited cash reserves and have developed strongly supportive links with several "partner" organisations to work to respond effectively to the challenges imposed by the pandemic.

I am confident that we are very well-placed to meet any challenge presented in the short or longer term and have used the adverse conditions imposed by the pandemic to establish a very sound base for future development.
