Fundraising ideas sought

THE BOARD of Directors have now started the process of applying for grants from a range of agencies to help to meet the cost of the proposed extension to clubhouse changing facilities. There is no way in which we can assess our chances of success but, in the current economic climate, we should obviously not be too optimistic.

Planning permission has already been granted and initial guotes indicate that we will need to find close to £40,000 to complete the work involved.

While we await the outcome of our bids for grant aid, we make an appeal to all Members to think of ways in which we might raise funds from other sources in order to be in a position to initiate the work with the minimum of further delay.

Anyone who might be in a position to make a direct cash donation should contact Finance Director, Rolf Meyer for a special form. Under the terms of our CASC registration, we are able to take advantage of Gift Aid arrangements allowing us to increase the value of any donations by 28%.


Syston Carnival

Coaching Corner concluded

- * If a Number 3 has any suggestions to make to his Skip, these should be made while both players are at the head unless there has been a significant change as a result of the first deliveries of the Skips. A Skip does not want or need any instructions when he's on the mat preparing to deliver his first wood.
- * If you have to give instructions, be very clear about which shot you want.
- Always get the measure out if there is the slightest doubt about the situation.
 Skip
- * Study the green and prevailing playing conditions.
- * Watch every move on the green.
- * Assess the opponents' strengths and weaknesses.
- * Identify strengths and weaknesses of your own players.
- * Encourage and inspire your own players to bring out the best in them,

- giving full encouragement to each one no matter how they are playing on the day.
- * Try to "lift" any individual who is having an off-day by stressing any positives.
- * Always give clear instructions.
- Involve all players into any discussions on tactics, working especially closely with your Number 3.
- * Be prepared to lead by example and to try every shot in the book.

Coaching corner

Club coach, Des Eggitt, offers advice on "effective fours"

I ead

- * Always bowl your "strongest" hand even if a wood looks to be on your line and close to the jack. If you take the right line and length there is always the chance that you could get the shot.
- * Always remember that, for a Lead, a good second is as good as shot wood.
- * Take care when delivering the jack. Lock on to the jack with finger and thumb on top for more control.
- * On slow greens, if you are one yard short, look for a yard behind the jack and bowl to that spot giving you the chance of stopping "jack high".

Number 2

- * Keep checking the score card with your opposing Number 2.
- * Look for a line on **both** hands during the trial ends in order to be ready to bowl on whatever hand your Skip asks.
- * As Number 2, you must have the skill to draw shot or to provide a "yard on" shot to secure a position in the head.
- * Always be positive. Never think that you can't play the shot you're asked to deliver. Throw caution to the wind and try it!

Number 3

- * All-too-often, a Number 3, finding the rink 2 or 3 up, will simply try to draw another shot into the head while ignoring the fact that the opposition have woods at the back. This is dangerous and irresponsible.
- * Always be positive and "aggressive" with your shots. There is nothing worse than a Number 3 who is consistently 2 or 3 yards short. *Concluded overleaf*
