WHILE Men's teams maintained their average shots per game (76 Saturday and 87 Weekday) they conceded more per game to the opposition (from 66 to 75 on Saturdays and from 77 to 81 on Weekdays).

The Ladies held their opposition to an average of 55 shots per match, the same as last year, but managed to score an average of only 55 per game this year compared to 59 per game in 2010.

Men's Weekday teams have enjoyed equal success at Home and Away (5 wins each). The majority of weekend losses (6 out of 11) were Home fixtures. Half of the losses suffered by the Ladies were Home matches.

Our green is playing much better than it has for years. The question must therefore be asked "Are we doing enough to take advantage of the improved surface?"

The broad picture

Taken as a whole, the analysis shows that, while we can be broadly satisfied with our performance to date, there is certainly room for improvement - especially if we wish to end the Season in as good a position as we did last year. It is worth repeating that apparently very small concessions on each rink - more often than not the result of a temporary lack of concentration - can have a very significant cumulative effect on the overall Season's performance. Let's all agree to concentrate that little bit more in the remaining games to end the Season on a high note.

Triples Leagues

Reports suggest that the Ladies are finding the additional fixtures associated with the Loughborough Triples Ladies League difficult to service due to a shortage of players. As featured in last month's edition of this Newsletter, the plea, by Captain Janice, to all Ladies to make themselves available for as many games as possible - League and friendlies - is repeated and emphasised.

At the time of going to press, the White Plums were running second in Division 2 of the Loughborough & District Triples League with 39 out of a maximun 48 points. The Green and Royal team were placed 3rd in Division 3 with 45 points out of a maximum of 54.

Brian Adams - A tribute



Brian Adams 1932-2011

BRIAN the youngest of three siblings, was born in Dewsbury. Yorkshire, which he left at 18 with two friends and set off to London to try to make it as a singer.

He was approached by an already established group, called The Raindrops, to leave his first group, the The Kingpins, to become a member alongside lead singer Vince Hill. With The Raindrops. Brian made his living by premiering newly written songs for the radio. It was through this work that he had been noticed and contacted by the already famous group, **The Dallas Boys**, to be their front man.

His debut with The Dallas Boys came sooner than expected when, after only four days of rehearsal, he was informed that the show would go ahead that night, complete with him in the line-up.

The Dallas Boys went on to appear in a record breaking 17 "Sunday Night at the London Palladium" shows, as well as feature on television shows such as the Generation Game, with Larry Grayson, and to sing before royalty.

The pinnacle of his career came in June 1989 where he sang on stage at Wembley Stadium before 70,000 people for two nights, appearing in Cliff Richard's "The Event". A particularly proud memory **Brian** had of the show was singing a duet with **Cliff**.

In 1984, whilst working in a summer season show at Newquay, Brian met Alison, a professional dancer. They later went on to get married and have their daughter, Laura, in 1989.

In his retirement, Brian took up bowling at St Margarets and moved to Syston Bowling Club in 2007 when his late father in law, *Tony Plowman* moved back from **St Margarets**. It was then that I first met Brian although he had lived only a few yard away for over twenty vears.

Brian was very innovative and was responsible for putting on shows at the bowling club. featuring his old show business friends. He took his bowling very seriously and we would spend many hours replaying the previous game while enjoying a coffee in the back garden. He had a great respect for Syston Bowls Club. Always the life and soul of the party, he had a never ending supply of jokes and stories from his show biz days.

With the passing of **Brian Adams**, not only has the bowling fraternity lost a good bowler, not only has our Club lost a good friend and ambassador, but I have lost my best mate - the brother I never had. RIP Pete Murray

The Club Coach Column

Des Eggitt

This month, Des highlights the importance of line and weight and stresses the need to sustain a positive attitude on difficult rinks.

EVEN the most difficult and irregular rink has a good hand - if you can find it. It pays to play it even though your opponents' woods block the way. Many matches are won or lost by forcing your opponents on to the difficult hand.

I was recently involved in a match on a difficult rink - one hand was very narrow while the other called for a wide draw. There was a very fine line which, if you hit it perfectly, left the jack open but, if you straved by the smallest margin, the wood cut sharply across the head and finished well wide.

Our four concentrated on finding that fine line and, equally important, the correct weight to get near the jack. This led to our Lead and/or No.2 consistently delivering at least one wood close to the jack (jack high and within a couple of feet) first which regularly gave us the chance to win the end by forcing the opposition to try another, more difficult track.

By not "giving in" to a tricky rink, we went on to win our four and help the team to victory. To be a consistent winner, you must adapt to and play the conditions (whatever they might

be) that little bit better than your opponents.

The message is: "Stav positive and play your shots. In any game, your opponent gets only as many shots as you allow him to get."

Always play the shot as you see it - as you would if practising in a roll-up.
