## The Club Coach Column



#### This month, Des stresses the importance of the Skip in developing compatibility within the team

the Skip - temperament, behaviour, encouragement and demonstration of bowling skills - will be

paramount in guiding the rink towards compatibility. A Skip must not squash natural exuberance and will need to lift anyone of an introverted nature or who appears unmotivated or lacking in interest in the game. A Skip must clearly show the charisma necessary for leadership and a depth of knowledge about the strategies and tactics of the game in order to gain the trust of fellow players. He/she must be able to "read" each player in order to get the best possible performance out of him/her. A good Skip will listen to the other players when deciding what shot to play - if necessary putting his/her own inclinations to one side. All too often, one sees Skips stubbornly persisting with their own choice | that is successful.

THE very important role of with an "I am the Skip and I make the decisions" attitude which can often lead to the loss of an end or of the match. The main responsibility of the Skip is to keep the rink plaving together as a cohesive unit. It is in the nature of the high profile position that the Skip's conduct and performance will be under the microscope. ("Leadership is an unflattering position") His/her conduct and performance should therefore be consistent and should be a demonstration of leading by example.

> Compatibility is a very important aspect of successful rink play with each player sharing the responsibility for promoting and fostering it according to his/her own way and ability. No player can afford to stand outside, aloof and alone. This can only be detrimental to the rink as a whole. Each individual must strive hard for the good of the whole and, as a result, share a pride in belonging to a rink
