## TEAMWORK - The role of Number Three



The third player in a fours team should have the forceful shots to change the head, for the Skip to have a way open to the jack. While the forcing bowl should be the speciality of a Number Three, he/she should nevertheless be a versatile player, capable of a delicate drawing shot or a yard-on shot, even, on occasion, a blocking shot. The Number Three, however, should never try to intervene once the Skip has decided on his/her shot. Nothing is more irritating to the Skip, or more likely to disturb his/her concentration, than a Number Three who will persist in gesticulating at the head.
Don't be dominated by your opposing Number Three. If he/she is asking for shots and you have any doubts, ask him/her to get the measure out to confirm the claim. Skip.
A Skip is generally chosen for his/her all-round bowling ability, but also, in part, because of his/her ability to get on with the members of the team. After all, the success of his/her own performance depends in large measure on what is done by those who bowl before. A really good Skip is an individual of pleasant personality who has the ability to get the most out of the team. A Skip's signals are very important. There is little point in merely throwing out an arm to indicate what hand should be used. Given precise instructions, a player will know what is expected. The Skip can indicate the route he/she wishes the player's bowl to take in coming into the head. If the Skip desires a yard-on shot to remove a bowl, he is more likely to get what he wants if, after indicating the bowl in question, he further points to the spot at which a drawing shot would come to rest - a yard through.
Finally, a Skip is in command of the rink, but that does not mean he/she makes all the decisions on what shot to play from the mat when the head has been changed by the opposing Skip. He/She must wait for instructions from the Number Three. Also he/she must allow the other players to help a player who is not playing well, to give him or her the confidence to get back into their game.
This is what teamwork means within the rink.

## GETTING THE BEST OUT OF ROLL-UPS

1. The bread and butter shot is the draw shot, and every member in a team should be able to draw but in roll-ups, don't be afraid to try other shots. Use the occasion to try or to practice all the shots in the game.
2. Keep the competitive element in roll-ups but not at the expense of the fun element.
3. Don't keep bowling long lengths all the time. Keep placing the mat at different lengths. or lay the mat where the last end finished.
4. Alternate playing positions within the rink to get practice on the delivering of the jack and the draw shot.
5. Our green is now bowling better so you are looking for touch bowling, in other words trying to feel the weight
6. Don't forget you are bowling to the shoulder of the line, that is where your bowl starts to slow down and turn towards the jack.
