TELL-TALE SIGNS OF OLD AGE

Everything hurts and what doesn't hurt doesn't work.

Your knees buckle but your belt won't.

READING A HEAD OF BOWLS

Some of our members said to me that we all read the head differently, that is right, but there is only the right shot!

A good example is Snooker, a player before he pots a red or other colour ball, looks for where he wants the cue ball to finish for his next shot of the break, then he can decide on how to strike the cue ball with correct weight.

In bowls, before you decide on your shot, you look for possible movement of jack or bowls. You can't play the shot until you know the possible outcome.

There is so much to learn about the tactics of the game.

The heads below are examples of the different shots:

1. The rink is one shot down, your bowls are on the right of the jack, the opponent's bowls are on the back-hand and the shot bowl is jack high, 12 inches away from the jack. There could be different shots to play, but if you bowl the back-hand you can draw off the shot bowl to trail the jack to your bowls on the forehand.

2. It could be a last end of a match, you have second bowl, but winning overall by one shot you have the last of the end, again there could be different options, this is the time to give the opponent's shot bowl to play an extra end.

3. There could be another head, being five or six shots down, you could bowl a firing shot hoping for the right result, or bowl with controlled weight using one of the shot bowls to finish in the head, to cut down the shots or get shot bowl.

There is one head you see often, is that one of the skips have five or more shots in the head, one of those shots is on the jack, but the other skip has a good second bowl and has the last bowl of the head, there is three ends to go and he is two shots down overall, like some other skips he bowls with a firing shot and takes out his second bowl, giving five shots away, now he is losing by seven shots, the right thing to do is not to bowl the last bowl and lose the end by one shot.

4. Remember, if you are two or three shot up, it does not pay to keep drawing to the jack, the number three must cover the opponents' bowls because of jack movement, to have bowls at the back of the head can stop the other skip from firing.

5. There are some heads where you can get the advantage by playing the same shot as the opponents.

The following heads are two examples: 1. The first head, one of the rinks had to change the length, the lead who delivered the jack took the mat up the green and the jack 7 feet from the ditch. After both front players of both rinks had played their bowls, the rink who bowled first had two shots close to the jack. now the skip had to decide what shot his No.3 had to bowl. There were a few options of good shots his No.3 could play, the jack was open for a perfect draw, it was 2 feet from the ditch. There was a shot for both rinks if successful, to have the advantage of winning the head, this is where both skips have to be first in trailing the jack into the ditch.

The second head is an example for the same shot but looking for a different result. *continued on page 4*

I was skip in a Surrey Count Pairs Competition and the pair we played against were very experienced, so most of the match we were behind on the scores but we didn't give up and on the 20th end we had levelled the scores. On the 22nd end we had a match winning two shots, the other skip and I had our last bowls of the match and I was the first to bowl, the lead and I looked at the options of what shot to play, both our shots were on the forehand, so I decided on a draw on the forehand, but it was the wrong hand, when deciding what shot to play, we should have looked at what shot the other skip might bowl. His lead had a bowl which was the third bowl, two feet short of the jack, the skip bowled at that third bowl pushing it in for shot and won the match.

I could have bowled the same hand with a back-hand draw, finishing behind the short bowl for another shot, or finishing as a blocker.

Remember the tactics of building a head to your advantage, so always decide on the shot that is going give you a positive result.

Always look where the opponent's bowls are in the head, because of the jack movement.

IT WOULD BE GOOD TO HAVE MORE REPORTS FROM CAPTAINS PLEASE

A New Format for Saturday Matches ??

Bowls Leicestershire have contacted all clubs within the county suggesting setting up a mixed Triple League to replace the existing friendly matches due to some clubs being unable to fulfil fixtures through lack of playing members.

The make-up of each club team would be 12 people in 4 rinks with at least one of each gender in each triples rink.

It is envisaged that clubs could play these league matches on a Saturday with start times between 1.30 and 2.30 pm. The format would be to play 2 sets of 9 ends. At the end of the first set, the home club would change to an adjacent rink and play the second set of 9 ends against the visiting team on that rink, i.e. 2 separate games. Scoring is by points and not shots, two points being awarded for each set won

and two points for the winning team overall (10 points available for each game).

Each Division of the League would be limited to a maximum of 6 teams, thus giving 10 matches over the months of June/July/August/September. Promotion would entail one up and one down.

Your Management Group have considered this issue and believe that in view of our current forward fixture lists as they stand at present (thanks to excellent work by Match Fixture Secretary George Dodge) we should retain the existing set-up of friendly Saturday Matches unless there is a significant change in circumstances in which case the situation would have to be further reviewed. One major setback with the Triple League would be a serious loss of revenue currently received from charges for teas and bar takings.

What are your views? Existing Friendly matches or another League set-up for Saturday matches.

Please let us know by contacting Club Secretary or any member of the Men's or Ladies Management Group/Committee. We need to respond to Bowls Leicestershire by 1st August.
